Affordable Housing Unit

- Works to advance the objectives of the City's 10 Year Housing and Homelessness Plan
- □ Works with external partners to facilitate the development of affordable housing
- ☐ Approximately 1,373 affordable units constructed since 2005



Why VisitAbility?

- ☐ Growing senior population
- ☐ Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act, 2005
- ☐ Provincial Policy Statement:
 - □ "healthy, liveable and safe communities are sustained by improving accessibility for persons with disabilities and older persons by identifying, preventing and removing land use barriers which restrict full participation in society"
 - □ "Planning authorities shall provide for an appropriate range and mix of housing types...by facilitating all forms of housing required to meet the social, health and well-being requirements of current and future residents, including special needs requirements"

Centralized Waiting List

- ☐ Approximately 10,800 households on CWL
- □ 206 modified unit requests as of December 31, 2014
- ☐ Seniors make up 21% of the total households on the CWL
- Median wait time for a modified unit is approximately 7 years



Older Adult Plan

- ☐ Informed by the World Health Organization's *Age-Friendly Cities* approach and philosophy
- Based on research and consultation with Ottawa older adults, and input from City departments/staff
- ☐ Focuses on areas that are within City mandate
- ☐ Introduces a vision for an age-friendly Ottawa, 8 strategic areas with long-term goals, and 74 concrete actions



Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act (AODA)

- ☐ City of Ottawa committed to meeting the requirements of the AODA
- □ Affordable housing projects approved and funded by the City comply with the AODA:
 - ☐ Minimum of 10% of units built are barrier free
 - ☐ Since 2002, the percentage of accessible units exceeded 12% of all units constructed



VisitAbility

- □ Ontario Building Code 15% of units within a multi-unit residential building must be designed with basic accessibility features
- □ Consultation with housing sector
- □ Visit-Able Housing section recently added to City of Ottawa Accessibility Design Standards
 - ☐ Applies to new construction of affordable rental housing in buildings of 24 or more units that are funded by the City of Ottawa.
 - ☐ For the private sector, visitability is encouraged for the construction and/or substantial renovation of residential housing units.



Cumberland Housing Corp.

- ☐ 16 townhomes
- □ Between 3 bedroom and5 bedroom units
- ☐ Originally planned to be 100% visitable
